Definitions:

fol-ly (fōl'ē) *n., pl. fol-lies*. **1.** A lack of good sense, understanding, or foresight. **2.a.** An act or instance of foolishness. **4. Obsolete. a.** Perilously or criminally foolish action. **b.** Evil; wickedness. **c.** Lewdness; lasciviousness.

jol-ly (jōl'ē) *adj. jol-li-er, jol-li-est*. **1.** Full of good humor and high spirits. **1.** To amuse oneself with humorous or teasing banter. **1.** *Chiefly British.* A good or festive time.

mer-ry (mēr'ē) *adj. mer-ri-er, mer-ri-est*. **1.** Full of high-spirited gaiety; jolly. **2.** Marked by or offering fun and gaiety; festive. **3. Archaic.** Delightful; entertaining.

Eph 5:4 Neither **(1)filthiness**, nor **(2)foolish talking**, nor **(3)jesting**, which are not **(4)convenient**: but rather giving of thanks.(KJV)

Definitions:

(1)Filthiness-151 aischrotes (ahee-skhot'-ace); from 150; shamefulness, i.e. obscenity: KJV-- filthiness.

(2)Foolish talking- 3473 morologia (mo-rol-og-ee'-ah); from a compound of 3474 and 3004; silly talk, i.e. buffoonery: KJV-- foolish talking.

(3)Jesting- 2160 eutrapelia (yoo-trap-el-ee'-ah);(meaning well-turned, i.e. ready at repartee, jocose); witticism, i.e. (in a vulgar sense) ribaldry: KJV-- jesting.1) pleasantry, humor, facetiousness

(4)Convenient- 433 aneko (an-ay'-ko); from 303 and 2240; to attain to, i.e. (figuratively) be proper: KJV-- convenient, be fit.

Mark 7:20 And he said, That which cometh out of the man, that **(1)defileth** the man.**21** For from within, out of the heart of men, proceed evil thoughts, adulteries, fornications, murders, **22** Thefts, **covetousness**, wickedness, deceit, lasciviousness, an evil eye, blasphemy, **pride**, **(2)foolishness**: **23 All these evil things** come from within, and defile the man.(KJV)

Definitions: **(1)defileth**; profane (ceremonially): KJV-- call common, defile, pollute, unclean.

(2)*foolishness foolishness, folly, **senselessness**

Matt.12:35-37-Idle word; inactive, i.e. **unemployed**; (by implication) lazy, useless: KJV-- barren, idle, slow.1) **free from labor, at leisure** 2) lazy, **shunning the labor which one ought to perform.** **NOTE: VAIN**- empty, having no real value; **idle, worthless: foolish, silly**: having or showing **undue or excessive pride about one's appearance or achievements: conceite**

Gal 5:19 Now the works of the flesh are manifest, which are these; Adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lasciviousness, **20** Idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, seditions, heresies, **21** Envyings, murders, drunkenness, **(1)revellings, and such like:** of the which I tell you before, **as I have also told you in time past, that they which do such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God.** (KJV)

Definitions: (1)revellings-2970 komos (ko'-mos); from 2749; a carousal (as if letting loose), a revel, carousal; a nocturnal and riotous procession of half-drunken and frolicsome fellows who after supper parade through the streets with torches and music in honor of Bacchus or some other deity, and sing and play before houses of male and female friends; hence, used generally of feasts and drinking parties that are protracted until late at night and indulge in revelry: KJV-- revelling, rioting. **reveling** 1. (n.) Joyful, exuberant activity and entertainment: • fun • reveling • cavorting • bacchanal • carouse • carousing • festivity • frolic • gaiety • jollification • jollity • merriment • whoopee (colloquial) • merrymaking • revel
